CLEAN IDENTIFIES MAJOR INITIATIVES FOR 2008

ALL BUSINESSES WITH EMPLOYEES OPERATING IN CAMPBELL INDUSTRIAL PARK SHOULD APPOINT AN EMERGENCY FACILITY COORDINATOR, AS OUTLINED BY THE CITY & COUNTY'S EMERGENCY OPERATIONS PLAN.

The coordinator serves as the liaison and link to the City's emergency response resources, and helps ensure employees are safe in the event of an incident such as a hazardous materials release. The coordinator is responsible for reporting incidents to the Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC), Hawaii State Emergency Response Commission (HSERC) and the National Response Center (NRC).

To help emergency facility coordinators be better prepared, the CLEAN board of directors has identified three major goals for 2008. The three projects that will be implemented this year are all designed to help improve safety and emergency response within Campbell Industrial Park and the surrounding areas.

>> 2008 EMERGENCY RESOURCE GUIDE

The Emergency Resource Guide, now going into its 11th year of production, continues to improve each year by becoming more user-friendly. As the Kapolei region grows, emergency preparedness will become even more important and the ERG includes relevant information for Kapolei businesses, especially those responsible for emergency preparedness. The ERG's directory, which includes names and contact information of emergency facility coordinators, is also extremely valuable. **Shirley Zhai**, vice president resource guide, is leading this project.

>> LARGE-SCALE EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS TRAINING SESSION

CLEAN will host a half-day basic emergency preparedness training, with an emphasis on hurricane preparedness, at no cost for businesses in the Kapolei region. The session, scheduled for May 16, 2008, would be targeted at emergency facility coordinators. Both CLEAN members and non-members would be welcome and include a free lunch. **Dan Fullenwider**, vice president - training, is coordinating this event. Watch for time and location.

>> STAND-ALONE WEBSITE

CLEAN currently does not have a website of its own, but has been part of the Local Emergency Planning Committee's website. The newly designed website will contain information about CLEAN as well as emergency preparedness tips and tools. **Annie Lam**, CLEAN president, is spearheading this effort.

FIRE PAL CD DISTRIBUTED TO 12 OAHU ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS



CLEAN DISTRIBUTED MORE THAN 3,000 CDs OF THE FIRE PAL PROGRAM, “STOP, LEAVE IT ALONE, GET A GROWN UP” TO 10 LEEWARD OAHU AND TWO HONOLULU ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS LAST YEAR.

The Fire Pal program is designed to inform children in the first through third grade what to do if they encounter hazardous materials such as cleaning agents, pesticides and paints. The CD also includes lesson plans for teachers and parents, along with a certificate of completion for children or teachers.

“The program provides tools and tips that will help young children protect themselves from hazardous materials that we use everyday in our homes or at school,” said **Annie Lam**, CLEAN president. “The interactive games are both educational and entertaining and show children how to make smart choices regarding hazardous chemicals. We’re glad to have partnered with the Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) to provide this as community service to our youth.”

In addition, the Honolulu Fire Department also gave away the CDs during Fire Prevention Week in September 2007.

HFD Hazmat Team Gains Practical Insight from Continuing Challenge Conference

Eleven members of the Honolulu Fire Department's Hazardous materials team joined their hazardous materials response team counterparts from throughout the Mainland, Canada and the Pacific Rim to learn more about the latest in protecting their communities at the 2007 Continuing Challenge Conference in Sacramento, California, last September.

HFD's participation in the annual event was made possible through a grant from CLEAN and the Local Emergency Planning Committee of Honolulu (LEPC). This is the fourth consecutive year that CLEAN has sponsored an HFD team. This past year's event, held at Hotel and Conference Center in Sacramento, included a week of classes with up-to-date information in the special operations field of hazardous materials. In addition, more than 90 vendors demonstrated state-of-the-art equipment. The HFD team took the opportunity to set up follow-up demonstrations and training.

The classes were led by the nation's top 140 instructors from various government and private agencies, including Department of Homeland Security, Department of Transportation, Environmental Protection Agency, FEMA, Emergency Medical Services, Hospital Emergency Room Decontamination, the U.S. Coast Guard and Clandestine Drug Labs. They focused on best practices to protect first responders and mitigate incidents.

HFD Team Places 2nd Overall in Hazmat Olympics

The Hazmat Olympics, a three-day competition among the hazardous materials teams is a highlight of the conference. The Honolulu Fire Department team placed 2nd overall in the competition. They performed valiantly but fell short of winning by 1/10th of a second.

There's always this year and we look forward to the challenge in 2008. The assistance of CLEAN and LEPC to allow members of our department to attend this nationally recognized training and instructional opportunity is priceless. Over the years as a conference attendee and now as a board member of the Continuing Challenge, I can say that the contacts that I have made through this opportunity has assisted me many times in the emergency operations we face in hazardous materials response in Honolulu. On behalf of the members of the Honolulu Fire Department whom you support, I thank you.
